Public Comments

There may be occasions when we feel a strong desire to respond forcefully to comments or behaviour that are hurtful, unfair, or deliberately provocative. Once we lower ourselves to responding in anger or hostility, we risk diminishing both our own standing and that of the organisation we represent.

Where a formal response is considered necessary, it will be addressed appropriately and on a case-by-case basis. In many instances, however, the wisest course of action is simply to let such comments "go through to the keeper" rather than giving unnecessary attention or fueling the fire. By remaining measured, respectful, and united, we continue to demonstrate the professionalism, dignity, and integrity that define our organisation.

Australia Honours Vietnam Veteran with Medal for Gallantry



Nearly six decades after one of the fiercest battles involving Australian forces during the Vietnam War, former Australian Army officer John O'Halloran has been formally awarded the Medal for Gallantry (MG), one of Australia's highest military honours for bravery in combat. The award recognises acts of exceptional courage performed under hazardous and life-threatening circumstances, and for many veterans it represents a significant acknowledgment of the sacrifices made by Australian servicemen in Vietnam.

Mr O'Halloran received the award at Government House in Perth in recognition

of his extraordinary leadership and courage during Operation Bribie in Phuoc Tuy Province, South Vietnam, in February 1967. At just 21 years of age and serving as a Second Lieutenant with 6th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (6RAR), he led his platoon during an intense and chaotic engagement against a heavily armed Viet Cong force concealed in dense jungle terrain.

Operation Bribie remains one of the most difficult and costly actions fought by Australian troops during the Vietnam conflict. Australian forces came under devastating enemy fire from well-fortified positions, suffering significant casualties and facing extremely dangerous conditions throughout the battle. Amid the confusion and danger, O'Halloran demonstrated outstanding leadership, remaining calm under pressure while directing and encouraging his men during the fierce fighting.

In one of the most remarkable moments of the engagement, O'Halloran gave the order for his soldiers to "fix bayonets and charge" against the enemy position. The action has since been recognised as the last Australian fixed-bayonet charge in combat history. Despite the enormous risks involved, the charge helped break the enemy resistance and prevented further losses amongst Australian troops.

Western Australia Governor Chris Dawson described the action as an extraordinary display of courage and leadership under fire. Members of O'Halloran's platoon later became some of the most highly decorated Australian soldiers to serve during the Vietnam War, reflecting both the intensity of the battle and the bravery displayed by those involved.

The Medal for Gallantry is Australia's third-highest decoration for gallantry and is awarded only in exceptional circumstances. Since its introduction into the Australian honours system in 1991, relatively few Australians have received the medal, highlighting the significance of the recognition bestowed upon Mr O'Halloran.

Speaking after the ceremony, Mr O'Halloran said he accepted the honour not only for himself, but also on behalf of the men with whom he served. His comments reflected the humility shared by many veterans who continue to place the focus on their comrades and the collective sacrifice of those who served alongside them.

For many within the veteran community, the award serves as a powerful reminder that acts of courage and service are never forgotten, even many decades later. It also reinforces the enduring respect Australians continue to hold for the men and women who have served the nation in times of conflict. The recognition of Mr O'Halloran's bravery stands as a tribute not only to one soldier, but to all Australians who served in Vietnam with courage, professionalism, and dedication.

Australia's Five Vietnam War Victoria Cross Recipients

The Vietnam War was one of the most challenging conflicts involving Australian forces during the twentieth century. Between 1962 and 1973, almost 60,000 Australians served in Vietnam, often operating in dangerous and demanding conditions against a determined enemy. Among those who served were five extraordinary soldiers whose courage and self-sacrifice earned the Victoria Cross — the highest award for gallantry in the face of the enemy.



Kevin Wheatley

Warrant Officer Class Two Kevin Wheatley was the first Australian awarded the Victoria Cross during the Vietnam War. In September 1965, while serving as an adviser to South Vietnamese forces, his unit came under heavy enemy attack. Despite intense fire, Wheatley repeatedly exposed himself to danger while assisting wounded soldiers and organising a withdrawal. When a fellow soldier was seriously wounded and unable to move, Wheatley refused to leave him behind. He remained with the wounded man, continuing to fight until both were killed by enemy fire. His actions reflected extraordinary courage, loyalty, and devotion to his comrades.



Peter Badcoe

Major Peter Badcoe was awarded the Victoria Cross posthumously for repeated acts of gallantry during 1967 while serving with South Vietnamese regional forces. He repeatedly led attacks against heavily defended enemy positions, often exposing himself to extreme danger in order to inspire and direct those around him. Badcoe became widely respected for his fearless leadership and willingness to place himself in harm's way to protect others. He was killed in action in April 1967 while leading another attack against enemy forces.



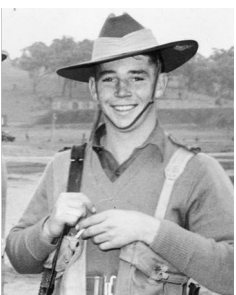
Ray Simpson

Warrant Officer Class Two Ray Simpson earned the Victoria Cross in May 1969 during intense fighting against North Vietnamese troops. Serving alongside indigenous soldiers and South Vietnamese forces, Simpson repeatedly moved through heavy enemy fire to rescue wounded personnel, reorganise defensive positions, and direct supporting fire. Although wounded himself, he refused evacuation and continued assisting his comrades throughout the battle. His leadership and bravery under fire were credited with saving numerous lives.



Keith Payne

Warrant Officer Class Two Keith Payne received the Victoria Cross for his extraordinary courage during a large-scale enemy attack in May 1969. Amid confusion, darkness, and intense enemy fire, Payne moved across the battlefield gathering isolated soldiers and leading them to safety. Despite suffering wounds himself, he repeatedly returned into danger to rescue others. His calm leadership and determination were instrumental in saving many lives during the engagement.



Richard Norden

Private Richard Norden became the fifth Australian Vietnam veteran to receive the Victoria Cross, awarded posthumously in 2024 for actions during the Battle of Fire Support Base Coral in May 1968. Serving with 1st Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (1RAR), Norden repeatedly exposed himself to intense enemy fire in attempts to rescue wounded comrades and recover fallen soldiers during a fierce North Vietnamese assault. At the time, he received the Distinguished Conduct Medal, but decades later a review determined his actions met the standard required for the Victoria Cross.

Understanding Australian Military Medals and Honours

Australian military medals and honours are awarded to recognise the service, sacrifice, bravery, and dedication of members of the Australian Defence Force. They serve as an enduring reminder of the contributions made by servicemen and women in times of war, conflict, peacekeeping, humanitarian operations, and national service. Beyond their physical appearance, medals carry deep personal meaning for veterans and their families, often representing stories of hardship, courage, mateship, and commitment to duty.

The Australian Honours and Awards system includes several categories of military recognition. These include gallantry and bravery awards, distinguished and meritorious service awards, campaign and operational service medals, long service and good conduct medals, and commemorative medals. Some decorations recognise acts of exceptional courage under enemy fire, while others acknowledge sustained dedication and professionalism over many years of service.

One of the highest and most respected awards is the Victoria Cross for Australia (VC), which is awarded for the most conspicuous gallantry in action in the presence of the enemy. Other important gallantry decorations include the Star of Gallantry (SG), Medal for Gallantry (MG), and Commendation for Gallantry. These awards are only bestowed in exceptional circumstances and reflect acts of bravery far beyond normal expectations.

Campaign and operational medals are awarded to personnel who have served in particular conflicts or operational areas. Australian veterans may wear medals recognising service in the First and Second World Wars, Korea, Malaya, Vietnam, East Timor, Iraq, Afghanistan, and numerous peacekeeping operations around the world. These medals acknowledge not only the dangers faced during service, but also the willingness of Australians to serve wherever they are needed.

Long service medals are another important part of the honours system and recognise years of dedicated and exemplary service within the Defence Force. Decorations such as the Defence Long Service Medal and National Medal acknowledge commitment, reliability, and professionalism over extended periods of time.

The order in which medals are worn is known as the “Order of Wearing” and reflects the significance and precedence of each award. Medals are traditionally worn on the left side of the chest during commemorative services and formal occasions. Family members may wear the medals of deceased relatives on the right side as a mark of remembrance and respect, ensuring the service and sacrifice of past generations continue to be honoured.

Each medal ribbon also carries significance, with colours and designs often symbolising aspects of the conflict, service branch, or type of award. To many veterans, the ribbon alone can instantly bring back memories of particular operations, deployments, comrades, and moments in time.

For many veterans and their families, medals are far more than pieces of metal and ribbon. They represent sacrifice, service, resilience, and the bonds formed between those who served together. They are also a visible reminder to the wider community of the debt owed to those who have worn the nation’s uniform.

Whether awarded for bravery in combat, long and faithful service, or participation in difficult operations overseas, Australian military honours help preserve the legacy of those who served. They ensure that the courage, dedication, and sacrifices of Australian servicemen and women are formally recognised and never forgotten.

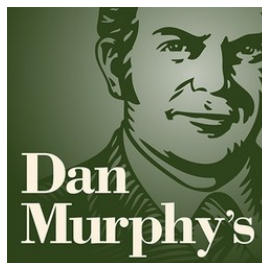
